FOR A TONGUE SO INTRIGUING

Conventional Classroom Method Apart, New Ways Of Language Learning are Coming Up These Days

f you have a love for languages and a flair for picking up complex tongues quickly, it could very well help you carve out a career

While the demand for foreign languages has always been there in India, new methods of learning are coming up. Technology has come into the forefront through online video chat sessions on language learning for those who are in urgent need of picking up a foreign tongue or those who have to go abroad.

"There is a change in the way learning is happening. More and more people are getting into teach-

ing now and doing it from home through online interactions. Students too are more open to learning in video chat sessions.

Learning is not just happening in the class but outside also," said Zenobia Irani, founder-director of InAWord centre for languages, Chennai. This could also be an option for those who may not find enough time to attend classes.

But this does not translate into a fall in demand for conventional classroom learning. In fact, centres for language learning could even get a higher inflow of students in the future with the threelanguage formula set to be introduced in CBSE schools by 2020.

With the formula mandating Indian languages to be picked as the second and third language, foreign languages may well be on their way out for a large number of schools, unless they offer them as electives. However, whether students will opt for a fourth language along with their academics remains to be seen. In such a scenario, enrolment in private centres could be on the rise, say experts.

The good part about securing a career in this field doesn't require you to have only language degrees. Nivedha V, a translator with Alliance Française in Chennai, says even without an UG degree, proficiency in the particular language can help students pursue a postgrad degree which is crucial for jobs. "Students can always enroll in a certificate course and get a good understanding of the language before pursuing a PG degree," she said. A tourism degree

at the UG level with a language degree could be a good combination too.

However, experts say a minimum of a B1 level

in language certification is required to land good opportunities, especially in MNCs which need translators and interpreters to interact with clients overseas.


With several engineering aspirants pursuing studies in Germany and also continuing to work there, language centres have seen huge demand for German.

While French too continues to see high demand, Spanish also is becoming important now with a lot of trade between India and Latin American countries, said

literally grew up learning different foreign languages. Studying in Puducherry, French was my first language in school, and later in college, I learned German and Spanish. Later, I continued learning German at Goethe Institut until I completed all levels of Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), in it.

I worked in the publishing sector for nine months; a job in which I had to proofread French medical books. I then moved on to working with a multinational e-tail firm where I corresponded with German vendors. In an MNC, however, there was only so much I could do with the language.

INaWORD, where I could learn more about the language than limit it to a certain job profile and requirement. I initially started with teaching the first two levels and moved on to level B2.

This job gives me the opportunity to constantly be in touch with what I have learnt all these years, and the chance to work with different people with various walks of life - from students to professionals and even old people.

Today, people who know foreign languages get recruited into customer care, vendor management and e-commerce sectors. You could become a translator or an interpreter too, but these areas require specific training along with your command over the language. Knowing the language along with other specialisations opens prospects for various jobs.

German along with a background in engineering can get you placed in

the IT sector, while foreign language experts with economics and accounting backgrounds are in great demand in banking, automobile sector etc. MNCs, however, remain the most commercially viable sector with salaries starting from over Rs-tlakh per annum.

The most important thing while learning a new language is to go in with an open mind. When you learn a new language, you're not just learning its grammar and communication, but also the ways of its people, their culture and how they think
